

A MESSAGE FROM

THE CHAIRMAN AND THE PRESIDENT

1994 was an eventful year for IIE. Not only did we initiate several new programs, described in this report, but we also celebrated seventy-five years of pioneering work in international educational and cultural exchange.

Marking this milestone provided an opportunity to thank the many donors, sponsors and volunteers whose vision and generosity make our activities possible. Throughout its seventy-five year history, IIE has worked at the intersection of colleges and universities, corporations, foundations, governments, and international organizations — mobilizing talent, forging partnerships, and leveraging resources to meet educational and training needs worldwide. We are grateful to all those who share our belief that investment in human capital is essential to promoting sustained progress — in the face of some very hard challenges — toward democracy and economic well-being around the globe.

IIE's seventy-fifth anniversary also provided the opportunity to acknowledge the achievements of the extraordinary men and women we have assisted over the years. These are the participants in our programs, people such as Hanna Holborn Gray, Thomas Pickering and Philip Glass — who were named recipients of IIE Alumni Awards in 1994 — and Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan, who spoke eloquently at our 75th Anniversary Forum of the profound impact that immersion in another culture had on him as a Fulbright Fellow abroad in 1950.

And there are others whose names are less well known who are making major contributions to their countries — for example, Vincent Zulu, the Minister of Education for Kwazulu Natal Province in South Africa; Vesna Pusic, Co-Founder and Director of the Institute for the Culture of Democracy, an NGO dedicated to the development of a civic political culture in Croatia; Jorge Bolivar Diaz Carranza, Director of the National Program Against AIDS in Guatemala; Ann Fisher, a U.S. Fulbright alumna who studied in Bangladesh and is now analyzing economic issues affecting rural women; or Flordeliza Andres, Assistant Secretary in the Department of Energy in the Philippines. The participants in IIE's programs are among the world's most talented men and women — the above are just a small group of our more recent fellows. The experience of seventy-five years tells us that they are also our future economic, political, and cultural leaders — the people who will make a difference.

Although no one knows what the next seventy-five years holds in store, two facts are clear: the global economy is now a reality, and the world is in the midst of a communications revolution that is reshaping the way we learn, interact, gain information, and share it with one another.

The implications of these two developments for the human resource needs of the 21st Century was the subject of IIE's 75th Anniversary Forum. The discussions provided a broad context

They reminded all of us involved in international education that we must be boldly proactive and innovative in educating a new generation of leaders in the public and private sectors — people who can function effectively in a complex, rapidly-changing economic, technological, and cultural environment, who are internationally “literate,” and who can strengthen the economic and political linkages so critical to a stable and democratic future.

YOUNG-GEUN LEE

Humphrey Fellow Young-Geun Lee is broadening his considerable expertise in airport construction and management with courses in urban and transportation planning at Rutgers University and networking with counterparts at the Federal Aviation Administration. He is in charge of planning and constructing the New Seoul International Airport (NSIA). When completed in 2020, it will be able to handle 100 million passengers on 530,000 flights a year. Here, Lee explains the principle of an airport hub.



In 1994, more than 10,000 men and women studied, conducted research, received practical training, or provided international technical assistance under the 248 programs IIE administered for 217 sponsors. They came from, or went to, 168 countries or other geopolitical entities. They included:

- More than 8,000 foreign students, academics, government officials, business managers and entrepreneurs, journalists, scientists, artists, and technicians
- More than 2,100 U.S. students, professionals, and artists studying, conducting research, providing technical assistance, working on arts projects, or serving as teaching assistants.

IIE also provided information on international education to several hundred thousand students, educators, policymakers, and others around the world through publications and videos, information centers, seminars, school outreach programs, and overseas university fairs. More than 650 regionally accredited U.S. colleges and universities were affiliated with IIE as Educational Associate institutions, and 75 foreign academic institutions and U.S. nongovernmental organizations were affiliated as International Associates.

STAFF AND OFFICES IIE had 347 employees worldwide in 1994. Of these, 185 were based at New York headquarters, 95 at IIE/Washington, the rest at U.S. Regional Offices in Chicago, Denver, Houston, and San Francisco; at IIE Overseas Offices in Hong Kong, Hungary, Mexico, Russia, and Thailand; and at project offices in Chile, Egypt, the Philippines, and Ukraine. In Indonesia, IIE is represented by the International Education Foundation.

VOLUNTEERS More than 5,600 volunteers provided a wide variety of indispensable services: as members of IIE's Board of Trustees and Regional Advisory Boards, as mentors to students on IIE-administered programs, as members of program advisory boards and selection committees, as professional resources in program design, as hosts to foreign students and visitors, as organizers of fundraising events, and as volunteers in IIE offices.

FINANCES In fiscal 1994 (Oct. 1, 1993-Sept. 30, 1994), IIE expended a total of \$88,765,000. Direct expenses for sponsored program services were \$81,596,300. Total costs for IIE information, research, counseling, conferences, arts services, and supporting services were \$2,906,800. IIE management and general, fundraising, and program development expenses were \$4,262,000, or 4.8 percent of total expenditures.

FUNDING SOURCES The sponsored programs IIE administers are funded by U.S. and foreign governments, foundations, corporations, international organizations, international development agencies and banks, universities, nongovernmental organizations, religious institutions and organizations, and individual donors. IIE's educational and arts services are supported by grants from the United States Information Agency; grants and contributions from corporations, foundations, and individuals; IIE Educational Associates and IIE International Associates membership fees; fundraising events; registration fees for U.S. universities fairs overseas; and sales and advertising revenue from publications.

IN 1994, IIE CELEBRATED 75 YEARS OF PIONEERING WORK IN INTERNATIONAL EDUCATIONAL EXCHANGE WITH A SERIES OF EVENTS DESIGNED TO BUILD ON THE PAST, CELEBRATE THE PRESENT, AND CHART A COURSE FOR THE FUTURE.

THE EVENTS HAD THREE OBJECTIVES: TO RAISE AWARENESS OF THE IMPORTANCE OF INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION, TO CONVEY DISCUSSIONS OF THE ROLE OF INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE IN TODAY'S GLOBAL CONTEXT, AND TO RECOGNIZE THE CONTRIBUTIONS OF IIE'S SPONSORS, SUPPORTERS, AND STAFF.

TECHNOLOGY AND TRAINING FOR A NEW CENTURY

"Investing in Human Capital: Leadership for the Challenges of the 21st Century" was the theme of the day-long 75th Anniversary Forum held on October 27 in the magnificent Celeste Bartos Room of the New York Public Library. The Forum stimulated dialogue and debate among the distinguished speakers and an audience of 250 decision-makers from the corporate, foundation, government, NGO, academic, and diplomatic communities.

New York Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan gave the opening address, citing his Fulbright year at the London School of Economics in 1950, as a self-described "gawky, unformed youth" who gained from the experience a life-long international perspective. Panelists examined the human-resource needs of the 21st Century in the light of two dominant issues: the emergence of a

global economy and the worldwide revolution in communications technology. Mary Robinson, President of Ireland, was keynote speaker. The panelists pictured on these pages explored the issues from perspectives ranging from that of the vice chairman of Citibank to a member of the regulating board of post-apartheid South Africa's Independent Broadcasting Authority to the president and rector of the new Central European University.


BENEFIT HONORS ROBINSON

On the evening of October 27, IIE hosted a gala benefit dinner as the culmination of the celebration. President Mary Robinson received IIE's Stephen P. Duggan, Sr., Award, named for IIE's founder and first president, for her contributions to international understanding. Former Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance made the presentation.

Special Alumni Awards for Distinguished Service were presented to composer Philip Glass (Arts), University of Chicago president emerita Hanna Holborn Gray (Education), and Ambassador Thomas R. Pickering (Diplomacy). Fulbright alumnus Garrick Utley was master of ceremonies. Some 400 people attended the black-tie event, which raised over \$500,000 in support of IIE's work.

CELEBRATIONS IN THE U.S. AND OVERSEAS

IIE's regional offices in Chicago, Denver, Houston, and San Francisco also incorporated the anniversary theme in their benefits; Henry Kissinger was guest of honor at a special anniversary luncheon in Houston. Celebrations were held in Mexico City, Jakarta, Tokyo, and Santiago. With additional events taking place in Bangkok, Hong Kong, and Moscow, the anniversary celebrations highlighted IIE's worldwide outreach and services.

1970s


IIE launches the South African Education Program to prepare for a post-apartheid future.

IN THE NATIONAL INTEREST

The many USIA-IIE partnerships in educational exchange over the years “are now being recognized as one of the most important tools in terms of pursuing our national interests,” USIA Director Joseph Duffey told 150 IIE sponsors and friends at the anniversary year’s opening reception March 8 at IIE’s New York headquarters. Ford Foundation President Franklin Thomas also addressed the gathering, noting that “no organization has been a more vital partner to the Ford Foundation than the Institute of International Education.”

The reception saw the premiere screening of a short video, narrated by John Chancellor, illustrating the value of international study and its impact on individual lives. It intersperses interviews with current IIE grantees with reflections by such distinguished alumni as Harvard president emeritus Derek Bok, British political leader Shirley Williams, television journalist Garrick Utley, and bank executive Isamu Koike.

(NIS) of the former Soviet Union, briefed an audience of 275 on the pioneering function educational exchanges have assumed in the post-cold war world. "Exchanges," he pointed out, "are now one key element of a massive effort by the nations and the people of the area to integrate their new nations into a wider, more modern, and better world community, and of a serious effort by America and other Western countries to encourage them to do so."

TRIBUTE TO STAFF

On June 10 in New York, IIE paid tribute to its multilingual, multicultural, multi-degreed, multigenerational staff members, past and present, without whom none of IIE's achievements would be more than inspired ideas. Henry Kaufman, chairman of IIE's Board of Trustees, gave a moving welcome address. "Education is at the heart of human progress," he said, "and that accounts for IIE's longevity over a time when other institutions have come and gone."

LOOKING AHEAD...

The anniversary year closed with a firm sense of commitment throughout IIE to continuing the pioneering tradition that has kept the Institute vital and growing for 75 years. President Robinson expressed it best when she said, "The role of international education cannot afford to be leisurely or reflective. It needs to be urgent, pro-active, innovative, looking through and beyond institutional structures to identify and empower a new generation for the future."

INVESTING IN HUMAN CAPITAL

“It is important to underscore the basic truth implicit in...the genesis of the Institute itself: investment in human beings is the most productive use of resources we have yet devised.”

The words are those of Ireland’s President Mary Robinson, spoken at IIE’s 75th Anniversary Forum in October 1994. They capped a day-long discussion of the opportunities and the hazards of a world where communication is instantaneous — for those who can afford the technology — and where the opportunity for developing human potential exceeds anything known in the past.

The anniversary provided a useful perspective as we approach the new century. IIE has reinvented itself approximately every decade of its 75 years, changing and growing to meet emerging needs. From the Twenties, when IIE worked to expand America’s international awareness, to today’s drive to help former Communist nations build democracies and viable economies, IIE has evolved with the times.

Spurred by the need to help stabilize transitions in the former Soviet bloc and South Africa and to facilitate democracy movements and free markets in the developing world, IIE in 1994 again initiated the renewal process by launching new programs and strengthening its human and electronic communications capabilities to carry them out. Among the year’s highlights:

- IIE added extensively to its roster of consultants and partner organizations and expanded its strong in-house capacity to assess and meet training needs, provide technical assistance, and conduct courses in participants’ home countries in such key fields as public administration, education, energy, the environment, privatization, small-business development, and the rule of law.
- IIE helped launch the U.S. Government’s National Security Education Program for U.S. undergraduates, the most ambitious publicly supported international education program for Americans since the Fulbright Program and the National Defense Education Act.
- IIE continued to expand and upgrade its state-of-the-art worldwide electronic communications system to speed communication, maximize use of in-house expertise, and increase cost-effectiveness for donors and program sponsors.

HUBERT H. HUMPHREY FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM MARKS ANNIVERSARY

AN IMPORTANT 1994 MILESTONE WAS THE 15TH ANNIVERSARY OF USIA’S HUBERT H. HUMPHREY FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM, ENHANCED BY A 30 PERCENT INCREASE IN ITS SIZE. IN 1979, IIE AND USIA INITIATED THIS NEW APPROACH TO INTERNATIONAL TRAINING. IT OFFERED DEVELOPING-COUNTRY PROFESSIONALS — SELECTED FOR THEIR DEMONSTRATED LEADERSHIP ABILITY — A YEAR OF NONDEGREE U.S. GRADUATE STUDY, PROFESSIONAL U.S. AFFILIATIONS, AND EXTENSIVE OPPORTUNITIES TO NETWORK WITH U.S. COUNTERPARTS AND EACH OTHER, INITIALLY TO ENCOURAGE BOTH NORTH-SOUTH AND SOUTH-SOUTH COOPERATION. IT WAS LATER EXPANDED TO INCLUDE PARTICIPANTS FROM EASTERN AND CENTRAL EUROPE. TODAY, THERE ARE 1,900 HUMPHREY ALUMNI IN 134 COUNTRIES, A VITAL INTERNATIONAL NETWORK.

INVESTING IN AMERICANS

WITH ACCENT ON DIVERSITY

To strengthen U.S. competitiveness in a global economy, as well as to deepen mutual understanding, U.S. Government agencies stepped up their investment in international study and training for Americans in 1994.

THE FULBRIGHT PROGRAM GROWS

The United States Information Agency (USIA) continued to increase the number of grants for U.S. graduate students under the Fulbright Program, from 512 in 1990 to 864 for 1994-95. A USIA committee has recommended increasing the number to 1,500 annually.

The expanded U.S. student program targets graduating seniors still shaping career plans, for whom the Fulbright influence may be more profound. One 23-year-old, for example, brought to his Fulbright year a bachelor's degree in biology, a love of African wildlife, and a commitment to protect the environment. In Botswana, he developed and carried out rigorous research on habitats and behavior of a termite important to ecosystems throughout southern Africa. With the encouragement of his University of Botswana professors, he is now heading for a Ph.D. and a career in the field.

NSEP: BUILDING U.S. COMPETENCE FOR A MULTICULTURAL WORLD

The National Security Education Program (NSEP) provides scholarship support for U.S. undergraduate study abroad in nontraditional fields and locations. Its goal: to prepare a broad base of future American leaders — scientists, educators, business men and women, engineers, health care professionals, civil servants — to communicate and compete in a multilingual, multicultural world. NSEP focuses on countries, fields of study, and institutions cur-

rently underrepresented in study abroad. IIE conducted the first competition to select undergraduates from the broadest U.S. geographic, ethnic, socioeconomic, and institutional spectrum. More than 1,800 undergraduates attending over 400 colleges and universities applied. In May 1994, the first 312 scholarships were awarded for study in 48 countries outside Western Europe, Australia, and Canada.

UNDERSTANDING REFORM IN EAST CENTRAL EUROPE

Strengthening U.S. understanding of reforms in East Central Europe and the former Soviet Union is the goal of the IIE-designed program, Professional Development Fellowships/East Central Europe, sponsored by the U.S. State Department. Grantees are young professionals in business and economics, law, journalism, public administration, and international relations. They study how ECE countries are shaping new institutions: market economies, democratic processes, a free press, civil liberties, and political rights. Projects in 1994 included a study of policies affecting aging populations in Croatia and Slovenia, environmental protection in Poland, and property rights in the Czech Republic.

U.S./EUROPE ENGINEERING EXCHANGE

Late in the fiscal year, IIE received support from the AT&T Foundation to launch the American/European Engineering Exchange (AE³). It will enable U.S. engineering students to spend a semester or a year in European universities and professional internships on an exchange basis. A consortium of 34 U.S. and European universities planned their first meeting in October 1994; the first students will be exchanged in Fall 1995.

REGIONAL PARTNERSHIPS

NAFTA IS THE ENERGIZER

The North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) spurred new North American education and training initiatives in 1994, from a pioneering trilateral academic exchange program to a Mexico-U.S. energy-training partnership. IIE also assisted Chilean environmental policy makers in their move to join NAFTA.

TRILATERAL EXCHANGES IN BUSINESS, ENGINEERING

IIE's North American Regional Academic Mobility Program (RAMP) is preparing Canadian, Mexican, and U.S. students of engineering, business, and environmental studies for careers in the age of NAFTA. The three-year pilot project is sponsored by the U.S. Department of Education's Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE), with cost-sharing by IIE and participating schools. RAMP started with business and engineering students in 1994; students of environmental studies will be added in 1995. IIE coordinates the informal consortium of 21 Canadian, 18 Mexican, and 17 U.S. universities. Participants from each country study in one of the other two on a tuition-swap basis, receiving academic credit from their home universities. In 1994, 31 business and 32 engineering applicants were accepted for study outside their own countries, as environmental studies faculty met to plan their recruitment efforts. The first-year participants rated the RAMP experience highly.

MEXICO-U.S. PARTNERSHIP FOR ENERGY TRAINING

The Mexico-U.S. Energy Training Partnership addresses Mexican energy needs through practical training — and more. One of the first workshops aided Chihuahua, Mexico's second-

largest cattle ranching state. Chihuahua is at the forefront of a drive to restructure Mexico's cooperative farm system and steer it toward a more market-oriented agricultural economy. Efficient water management is crucial.

Toward this goal, IIE designed and conducted a workshop in Spanish for 27 Mexican and U.S. engineers on "Water Pumping for Productive Applications with Renewable Energy Sources" — in this case, solar energy. The participants installed two complete solar-powered water pumping systems at separate sites, replacing gasoline-powered equipment. The Mexican counterparts were DGRE, a state rural development agency, and the University of Chihuahua. In developing the program, IIE drew on the expertise of the Sandia National Laboratory, the Southwest Technology Development Institute of New Mexico State University and the Alternative Energy Institute of West Texas A&M University.

FACILITATING CHILE'S MOVE TOWARD NAFTA

IIE's Professional Exchange Programs (PEP) division helped facilitate Chile's move to join NAFTA. Chile must meet required environmental standards in order to join. For the U.S. Trade Development Agency (TDA), IIE designed a U.S. orientation visit enabling the Chileans to describe their needs and U.S. environmental firms to demonstrate their capabilities. BUILDING DEMOCRACIES

TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE IN THE NEWLY INDEPENDENT STATES

With new offices in Moscow and Kiev and one scheduled to be opened in Almaty, IIE in 1994 intensified training and technical assistance activities in the former Soviet Union. Priorities included restructuring energy and environment policies, developing the knowledge and skills essential to market economies, and reforming legal infrastructure.

MUSKIE FELLOWSHIPS: MUTUALLY BENEFICIAL

In its second year, USIA's Edmund S. Muskie Fellowship Program gave 33 NIS professionals under IIE supervision the opportunity to observe market economics and democratic institutions at work through U.S. academic study and professional internships. Fellows spend nine months studying business, economics, law, or public administration at the graduate level, followed by three or more months of practical training in the form of internships. The latter have proved mutually beneficial, leading in some cases to home-country jobs for fellows and overseas positions for U.S.-trained staff in companies operating in the NIS. Companies hosting Muskie Fellows in 1994 included Amoco, INTELSAT, Honeywell Commercial Flights Systems, and the U.S. Government's Overseas Private Investment Corporation (OPIC). Fellows are selected through an open, merit-based competition; professionals from Armenia, Azerbaijan, Belarus, Georgia, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Moldova, Russia, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, Ukraine, and Uzbekistan are eligible.

Since glasnost, IIE's PEP division has arranged many U.S. visits for NIS leaders and professionals in fields crucial to working democracies. In 1994, IIE arranged for nine Albanian university administrators to meet with key U.S. counterparts across the country, exploring aspects of university management from finance to accreditation to faculty development and covering agricultural education, vocational-technical training, and community colleges. USIA's Office of International Visitors sponsored the visit.

ABA COURSES FOR RUSSIAN LAWYERS, JUDGES

UP TO 1,700 RUSSIAN LAWYERS AND JUDGES WILL RECEIVE TRAINING AS PART OF A PROGRAM CONDUCTED IN COLLABORATION WITH THE AMERICAN BAR ASSOCIATION (ABA). THROUGH ITS MOSCOW AND WASHINGTON OFFICES, IIE, AS SUBCONTRACTOR TO ABA, WILL PROVIDE MANAGEMENT AND TRAINING-SUPPORT SERVICES FOR THREE-DAY TO TWO-WEEK COURSES IN THE NIS, TARGETING JUDGES, LAWYERS, AND OTHER LEGAL PROFESSIONALS. ABA WILL RECRUIT U.S. LAWYERS AS TRAINERS; IIE WILL WORK WITH THEM TO ENSURE QUALITY, RELEVANCE, AND STANDARDIZATION OF TRAINING DELIVERY. IIE'S MOSCOW-BASED TRAINING MANAGER WILL ALSO COORDINATE PROJECT ACTIVITIES WITH ABA'S PROJECT LIAISONS THROUGHOUT RUSSIA AND THE NIS.

HOME-COUNTRY TRAINING FOR ENERGY PROFESSIONALS

For USAID's NIS Energy Training Development Program, IIE worked with USAID missions to identify training needs and priorities, then developed and presented courses in Russia, Ukraine, and Kazakhstan for energy professionals and policy makers. Focusing on how the energy sector functions in a market economy, the courses cover economics, management of profit-making companies, and financing for capital-intensive industries.

ASIA: PARTNERS IN GROWTH

EXPLORING COOPERATION ON A VARIETY OF FRONTS

Sponsors invested significantly in human-capacity development in Asia, to support rapidly growing market economies and manage the social and environmental consequences. IIE also convened a high-level symposium to explore closer economic cooperation among Pacific Rim nations.

IN EAST ASIA: REGIONAL TRAINING

IIE's Bangkok office relocated to larger quarters to support USAID's East Asia Regional Training Project (EARTP), created to increase the regional pool of professionally and technically trained people. IIE conducted an inventory of Asian training resources, assessed Mongolia's English-language-training needs, and designed and presented nine U.S.-based courses in environmental and natural resources management for Royal Thai Government officials. To provide perspectives on the rule of law, IIE arranged for justices of Mongolia's Supreme Court and Constitution Court to meet with U.S. Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, constitutional scholars, and U.S. university law faculty. To support USAID's humanitarian assistance for war victims, IIE also assessed the needs of NGOs working in Vietnam for staff training in prosthetics and orthotics.

IN VIETNAM: ACADEMIC TIES

To strengthen U.S.-Vietnam educational ties, IIE organized a delegation of U.S. college and university presidents who met with counterparts in Vietnam in November 1993. A high-level delegation of Vietnamese academics and ministry officials reciprocated with a U.S. visit in May 1994.

PACIFIC RIM LEADERS EXPLORE ECONOMIC COOPERATION

Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) is both the name and the goal of a group of government leaders from Pacific Rim nations. With USIA sponsorship, IIE arranged a symposium in San Francisco for USIA-sponsored Humphrey and Fulbright fellows from APEC nations, to explore key issues with U.S.

academic, business, and government leaders. Panelists from the Brookings Institution, Boeing Corporation, the National Academy of Sciences, the National Security Council, and the University of California at Berkeley led the discussions. Broad topics included the role of an Asia-Pacific economic community in the global economy, trade incentives and barriers, the roles of China, Japan and the U.S., and the potential effects of and upon telecommunications, environment, human resources, and energy.

IIE also arranged coast-to-coast site visits for 14 influential Pacific Rim writers, editors, economists, and government and labor representatives. They met with key figures in U.S. industry, banking and finance, and agriculture.

ENERGY MANAGEMENT

For USAID's Energy Training Program (ETP), IIE provided training in private-sector financing, resource planning, and demand-side management.

An IIE/ETP seminar in Manila on the Build, Operate, Transfer (BOT) method for private financing of infrastructure projects drew 54 government officials.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE IN AFRICA

SAEP ALUMNI JOIN THE MAINSTREAM

When the April 1994 elections ended the apartheid era in South Africa, more than 1,300 black South Africans with U.S. academic degrees earned through IIE's South African Education Program (SAEP) were prepared to assume mainstream responsibilities. Together with alumni of IIE's other South African programs, they are making a difference.

Priscilla Naidoo, with a master's in film technology from New York University, is media liaison officer in the office of President Nelson Mandela. Monwabi Fandeso, with an MBA from the Wharton School, is managing director of New Age Beverages, Pepsi Cola's new division in South Africa. St. Peter's College alumnus Molefe Mokgatle is acting director of the South African Broadcasting Corporation (SABC). Job Mokgoro, with a University of Toledo M.A. in public administration, is director general of Northwest Province. Vincent Zulu, Ph.D., is minister of education of Kwazulu Natal; he earned his M.A. at Vanderbilt University through SAEP.

To address immediate human-resource needs, SAEP today is focusing on graduate rather than undergraduate training. Business, management, and public administration are among priority fields. Support for SAEP comes from a public-private partnership, including major funding by USAID, corporate and foundation support, and cost-sharing by U.S. colleges and universities.


IIE administers seven other programs for South Africa. They include linkages between U.S. and South African university departments in agriculture, policy studies, and mathematics; the Career Development Fellowship Program for midcareer training and practical experience;

the Church Leaders Development Project; the Archbishop Desmond Tutu Southern African Scholarship Fund; the South African Information Exchange; and a program at Williams College providing a one-year master's degree in macroeconomics. At the year's end, the Children's Television Workshop chose IIE to administer a program of practical training for six black South Africans, with the possibility of co-producing "Sesame Street" in South Africa.

USING ENERGY RESOURCES EFFECTIVELY

Elsewhere in Africa, IIE provided training and technical assistance in effective use of energy resources. In Botswana, for USAID's Energy Training Program (ETP), IIE conducted a workshop on renewable energy development in partnership with the Southern Africa Development community. It was designed to expand decision makers' energy options to include solar, wind, and hybrid systems.

With a project office in Cairo under the Egypt Energy Manpower Development Project (EEMDP), IIE organized training courses for the Egyptian Electricity Authority (EEA) in human resource development, resource planning, and economic and financial analysis of energy projects. IIE also organized a U.S. study tour for senior EEA executives, who examined the operations of profit-making electric utilities, senior-management development programs, and skills-training programs in U.S. utilities.

**BOOI THEMELI**

"The new South Africa needs more well-qualified black economists," wrote University of Cape Town economics lecturer Booi Themeli in applying to IIE's South African Education Program (SAEP). To prepare South African university students to shape their country's new economic future, he is earning his doctorate at Fordham University, concentrating on advanced economic theory and international economics. His goal: "to enrich my understanding of orthodox and emerging economic and political issues in the world."

CULTURE AND COMMUNICATION

THE FULBRIGHT ROAD TO MUTUAL UNDERSTANDING

With almost 3,200 Fulbrighters from 132 countries studying in the United States and 850 U.S. grantees abroad, the USIA Fulbright Program is the largest program IIE serves. It was created in 1946, initially with proceeds from the sale of World War II surplus equipment, to increase mutual understanding between the United States and other countries. IIE has worked with the U.S. Government in administering it since the beginning.

Increased Fulbright opportunities for U.S. students are described on page 12. For foreign students, 1994 saw greater emphasis on professionals in law, public administration, and business. A young Salvadoran, for example, is earning a master's in commercial law to contribute to the reconstruction of

her country. A Vietnamese is studying taxation law and tax policies to encourage foreign investment.

In East Asia, for the first time, there was Fulbright activity in every country except North Korea, including new initiatives in Cambodia, Laos, and Mongolia. Nearly 50 Vietnamese Fulbrighters have begun study in the United States since the program resumed there in 1992. For 15 Vietnamese Fulbrighters completing their studies in 1994, IIE arranged a seminar designed both to enable them to evaluate their U.S. experience and to prepare them for their return to a very much changed Vietnam.

IMPACT OF THE NEW TECHNOLOGY

HOW WILL TODAY'S SOPHISTICATED COMMUNICATIONS TECHNOLOGY AFFECT EDUCATION AND EDUCATIONAL EXCHANGE? AT IIE'S 75TH ANNIVERSARY FORUM, PANELISTS UNDERSTANDABLY RAISED MORE QUESTIONS THAN ANSWERS. HOW CAN THE MIRACLE OF VIRTUALLY INSTANT ACCESS TO INFORMATION WORLDWIDE — FOR THOSE IN A POSITION TO TAKE ADVANTAGE OF IT — BEST BE DEFINED AND SHAPED? WILL POOR COUNTRIES BE LEFT BEHIND? WHAT WILL BE THE IMPACT ON CULTURAL IDENTITY? ON LANGUAGES? WHILE TELEVISED DISTANCE EDUCATION HOLDS IMMENSE PROMISE, TO UNDERSTAND ANOTHER COUNTRY, IN THE WORDS OF FULBRIGHT ALUMNUS SENATOR DANIEL PATRICK MOYNIHAN, ONE MUST GO THERE AND "STUDY IT, AND SEE IT, TASTE IT, TOUCH IT, FEEL IT, BE PART OF IT."

Latin America's Fulbright programs are expected to expand in Argentina, Uruguay, and Colombia. For Mexico's Fulbright-Garcia Robles Program, 77 grantees began their studies in 1993, bringing the total in the United States to over 300. Support for Fulbrighters is also provided by CONACYT, Mexico's National Council on Science and Technology. USIA-funded IIE seminars gave Latin American students returning home an opportunity to examine the Fulbright experience in relation to home-country needs.

In Africa, there was increased funding for new students, and the Fulbright Program added newly independent Eritrea. IIE conducted workshops and consultations in seven Southern African countries.

Western Europe again had the greatest number of Fulbright grantees in the United States — 1,376. Spain initiated seven new programs; one provides U.S. professional affiliations of up to one year for key Spanish Government civil servants in public works and environmental agencies. In East Central Europe, a new Fulbright Commission was created in Slovakia. The 143 grantees from the former Eastern bloc concentrated on fields important to the transition to democracy and free markets.

PROFESSIONAL EXCHANGES

THE BENEFITS ARE MUTUAL

IIE's Professional Exchange Programs (PEP) division is IIE's rapid-response team. Staff members design one- to five-week U.S. travel and study programs for individuals or groups, tailored to their professional goals, country development needs, and U.S. foreign policy objectives. When time is of the essence, staff can design a program in two to five days and implement it within weeks.

In 1994, these programs, most of them sponsored by USIA, reached 823 participants from 121 countries. They demonstrate IIE's active commitment to furthering international peace and development, U.S. success in the global economy, and an understanding of U.S. society and culture abroad.

With the passage of NAFTA, IIE has played an increased role in encouraging hemispheric linkages. USIA's North American Higher Education Cooperation Project brought five university administrators from Canada and five from Mexico to U.S. universities to explore concrete opportunities for trilateral cooperation in environmental studies, business management, and distance learning.

Other programs bolstered peace prospects in the Middle East. To acquaint U.S. citizens with long-term efforts to bridge Middle East differences, IIE designed a program for Israeli and Palestinian artists who had exhibited their works together for ten years, in defiance of authorities. IIE also conducted a one-month USIA/USAID study tour for Israeli and Palestinian secondary school principals. For Palestinian engineers who are designing an independent power system for the West

Bank and Gaza, IIE arranged a three-week training program sponsored by the U.S. Trade and Development Agency. It was one of the first U.S. government initiatives involving U.S. firms in assisting Palestinians in building their infrastructure.

To strengthen the role of an independent press in Russia and Kazakhstan, IIE conducted a

reciprocal program for the USIA Office of Citizen Exchanges. First, Russian and Kazakh journalists attended seminars on newspaper operations, ethics, and management, followed by month-long U.S. internships. Second, U.S. media specialists led discussions with and trained additional journalists in Vladivostok, Almaty, Nizhny-Novgorod, and St. Petersburg.

To foster the unification process in Germany, IIE arranged two study tours for the German Marshall Fund. Topics included economic development, rural government, urban planning, and industrial revitalization.

THE ARTIST AS AMBASSADOR

ARTS INTERNATIONAL FORGES CONNECTIONS

Through grants, advocacy, exchange, and information, IIE's Arts International (AI) division creates connections among professional artists worldwide, emphasizing the artist's role as communicator and ambassador.

The Lila Wallace-Reader's Digest International Artists program in 1994 enabled 24 U.S. visual artists to spend up to six months in residence with world arts organizations as diverse as the Tandanya Aboriginal Cultural Institute in Australia and Monet's Gardens at Giverny, France. On their return, they collaborated with U.S. arts organizations to present community programs based on the international experience.

Philadelphia artist and community activist Lily Yeh spent three months in Kenya organizing a mural project with community members to beautify the courtyard of a church in one of Nairobi's poorest communities. Returning to the United States, she worked in northern Philadelphia with The Village of Arts and Humanities, collaborating with children, teachers, and community members to produce an exhibition of art work and photographs from Kenya, banner- and art-making workshops, and a mosaic park.

Under AI's management, in 1994 The Fund for U.S. Artists at International Festivals and Exhibition awarded over \$1 million to 131 performing arts groups and individuals, enabling them to participate in international festivals in 49 countries. The fund is a public-private partnership of the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA), the U.S. Information Agency, The Pew Charitable Trusts, and The Rockefeller

Foundation. AI's Travel Grants Fund for Artists, a joint project with the NEA, enabled 57 individual performing, visual, media, and literary artists to interact with colleagues throughout the world. The Pew Charitable Trusts makes AI's participation possible.

In 1994, the Mexican Visual Artists Program, funded by the U.S.-Mexico Fund for Culture, awarded four Mexican visual artists six-week residencies at U.S. arts organizations. IIE developed the program to encourage Mexico-U.S. arts exchanges and to promote Mexico's vital contemporary arts throughout the United States.

1994 saw the continuation of AI's Cultural Leadership Project for East and Central Europe, supported by The Pew Charitable Trusts to strengthen management and enhance the institutional capacities of the region's arts organizations. Phase II of the program included on-site work with U.S. arts managers and management workshops in Hungary, Czech Republic, Slovenia and Poland. AI is preparing a handbook on arts management covering fundraising, marketing and public relations, and networking.

In 1994, AI's second book, *American Visions/Visiones de las Américas*, was published by the American Council for the Arts. Edited by AI Director Noreen Tomassi, with curators Mary Jane Jacob and Ivo Mesquita, it contains articles by leading artists, critics, and curators from throughout the Americas, as well as 23 full-color artists' pages commissioned for this volume.

CHANNELS OF COMMUNICATION

FOR HUMAN RIGHTS ACTIVISTS, JOURNALISTS, WOMEN

Projects opening up channels of communication, in person and in print, played a significant role in 1994. Among them were a report on the status of African human rights organizations, journalist exchanges, and a program to promote international networking among Chinese women NGO leaders. The latter was created in honor of IIE Life Trustee Elisabeth Luce Moore.

IIE HUMAN RIGHTS REPORT ANALYZES AFRICAN NGO RESOURCES

As the culmination of a two-year collaborative project of human-rights activists in African NGOs, IIE's International Human Rights Internship Program (IHRIP) published a report on *The Status of Human Rights Organizations in Sub-Saharan Africa* in cooperation with the Swedish NGO Foundation for Human Rights. Researchers met with almost 200 organizations in 26 countries. The report examines characteristics common among the organizations, their training needs, and their capacity to train other activists. IHRIP's core program supports professional affiliations with more experienced human rights organizations for staff members of human rights organizations in countries of the South, the former Soviet Republics, and East Central Europe.

NORTH AMERICAN JOURNALIST EXCHANGE

Strengthening Canadian knowledge of Mexico was one of the goals of April Lindgren, national affairs reporter for *The Ottawa Citizen*. During her three-month internship with *La Reforma* in Mexico City, she also wrote for Canadian readers about the Mexican elections, church-state relations, and the disturbances in Chiapas. She was one of 12 journalists participating in the Canada-Mexico-U.S. Tri-Lateral Journalist Exchange, sponsored by the Freedom Forum. Each spent a three-month professional affilia-

tion with a host publication in one of the other countries, reporting for their home publications. Mexico's Chamber of Deputies (*La Camara de Diputados*) also sponsored a U.S. exchange program for Mexican journalists who cover Mexican congressional news. IIE arranged professional affiliations with two Spanish-language TV stations and a newspaper.

LINKING U.S. AND CHINESE WOMEN NGO LEADERS

TO HONOR ELISABETH LUCE MOORE'S LIFELONG COMMITMENT TO THE ADVANCEMENT OF CHINESE WOMEN AND SUPPORT OF NONGOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS (NGOS), IIE CREATED THE ELISABETH LUCE MOORE LEADERSHIP PROGRAM FOR CHINESE WOMEN FROM THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA, HONG KONG, AND TAIWAN. THE FOUR-YEAR PILOT PROGRAM, FUNDED BY THE HENRY LUCE FOUNDATION, WILL BRING EIGHT CHINESE WOMEN NGO LEADERS TO THE UNITED STATES EACH YEAR FOR FOUR WEEKS OF LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT AND NETWORKING WITH U.S. NGO COLLEAGUES.

JAPAN-U.S. WOMEN LEADERS NETWORK

The Japan-U.S. Women Leaders Dialogue, created to bring professional women together to address common problems, was expanded in 1994 to the Japan-U.S. Women Leaders Network. It will share the benefits of the exchange with more women NGO leaders in both countries. Emphasis will be on longer one-on-one and small-group relationships within an institutional context, to develop skills to strengthen their organizations. The project is funded by the Japan Foundation Center for Global Partnership, the Asia Foundation, the Freeman Foundation, and the Mitsubishi Bank Foundation. IIE administers it in cooperation with the Japan Center for International Exchange.



IIE COMMUNICATIONS & RESEARCH

ADDING TO THE KNOWLEDGE BASE

For thousands around the world, IIE research and publications contribute to the knowledge base that shapes international education and training decisions for individuals, institutions, and governments. In 1994 they included annual directories of international study opportunities, statistical research and analysis of international student flows, and directories of home-country job opportunities for foreign students returning home. They also included working papers and on-line support for non-governmental organizations in South Africa.

IIE's two major annual publications, *Academic Year Abroad* and *Vacation Study Abroad*, continued to provide current, detailed information on 3,700 international study programs in over 80 countries. Compiled by IIE staff, they are the standard reference works in the field.

New in 1994 was *Continental Responsibility: European and International Support for Higher Education and Research in East Central Europe*, compiled by IIE's East Central Europe director Mary Kirk and Aaron A. Rhodes of the Institute for Human Sciences in Vienna. It provides a comprehensive inventory of initiatives undertaken by European institutions and international organizations to assist the transformation of higher education and research in East Central Europe. This is the third report of IIE's East Central Europe Information Exchange, initiated in 1991 with Ford Foundation funding and sustained by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation and the Pew Charitable Trusts.

For educational policy makers in the United States and abroad, IIE research provides solid facts and figures as a basis for policy decisions. IIE's *Open Doors 1992-93*, for example, provided statistics on 438,600 nonimmigrant international students in the United States and on

71,200 U.S. students abroad. The information is compiled by IIE's Research Division with USIA support and with data provided by 92.9 percent of the 2,783 regionally accredited post-secondary institutions in the United States.

SOUTH AFRICAN INFORMATION EXCHANGE

Since 1986, IIE's South African Information Exchange has been collecting, publishing, and disseminating information about international resources to support Southern African NGOs. The resultant 26 working papers were designed to help them raise funds and establish relationships with international donor agencies as well as to establish linkages among the NGOs themselves. The 27th volume, published in 1994, focuses on foreign assistance to South Africa. Like other SAIE publications, it is accessible on-line on SANGONeT, the computer-based communications and information network based in South Africa.

Working Paper 28, completed at the end of 1994, is a directory and handbook on linkages between U.S. and South African academic institutions, supported by USIA and the Kellogg Foundation.

ACROSS THE NATION

IIE REGIONAL OFFICES ARE VITAL CENTERS

IIE/MIDWEST

The Chicago-based IIE/Midwest office arranged a USIA-sponsored seminar for Fulbright grantees on "Jobs and the Urban Crisis: Chicago as Example." Former U.S. Secretary of Labor Lynn Martin was keynoter. With Roosevelt University, IIE/Chicago presented a USIA workshop on enhancing leadership skills for students from Asia and the Pacific. A fundraising "Evening with Paul Volcker" event raised a record \$137,000 and, among other things, helped fund study-abroad scholarships for 30 U.S. students from the region.

IIE/ROCKY MOUNTAIN

Denver's IIE/Rocky Mountain staff conducted a USIA seminar to help prepare Latin American Fulbright grantees for the return home by exploring Latin American economic and environmental issues. In cooperation with the University of Colorado, IIE/Denver presented a six-week USIA Summer Institute for 23 teacher-trainers of English as a Foreign Language (EFL) from East Central Europe, Russia, and Ukraine. One Congolese and two U.S. students were awarded IIE/Denver's IIE/Adell & Hancock research grants. The \$5,000 IIE/Nancy Petry Grant in Aid went to Bonnie Fleming, a Native American musicologist, for research in England.

IIE/SOUTHERN

IIE/Southern, as Houston sponsor for Business for Russia, arranged internships and homestays for 22 Russian managers and entrepreneurs. Host organizations included Tenneco, Inc., the Westin Galleria Hotel, Texas Commerce Bank, *The Houston Chronicle*, and Browning Ferris Industries. At the Fulbright Enrichment Seminar on "Ethical Dilemmas for the 21st Century," speakers included Dr. Richard E. Wainardi, president and CEO of the Texas

Medical Center, and Dr. Red Duke, an internationally renowned trauma physician. The Fulbright Central American Student Seminar explored economic cooperation in Central America. IIE/Houston's Schools Program, focused on Egypt, surpassed its goal of reaching more than 25,000 students and won Leadership Houston's top award for international education.

OUTREACH FOR INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION

IIE'S REGIONAL OFFICES IN CHICAGO, DENVER, HOUSTON, AND SAN FRANCISCO SERVE AS VIBRANT INTERNATIONAL CENTERS FOR THEIR REGIONS. FOR STUDENTS ON IIE-ADMINISTERED PROGRAMS, THEY ACT AS LIAISON WITH UNIVERSITIES, CONDUCT SEMINARS, AND, THANKS TO DEDICATED VOLUNTEERS, PROVIDE IIE STUDENTS OPPORTUNITIES TO EXPERIENCE U.S. LIFE OFF-CAMPUS. FOR IIE EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATE AND INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATE INSTITUTIONS (SEE PAGE 31), THEY HOST BIENNIAL SEMINARS WITH IIE OVERSEAS OFFICE DIRECTORS TO SHARE INFORMATION AND EXPLORE KEY TOPICS. THEY BRING SPEAKERS ON INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS TO THEIR COMMUNITIES, ARRANGE HOSPITALITY AND PROFESSIONAL NETWORKING OPPORTUNITIES FOR INTERNATIONAL VISITORS, PROVIDE INFORMATION ON STUDY-ABROAD OPPORTUNITIES, AND RAISE FUNDS FOR SCHOLARSHIPS.

IIE/WEST COAST

To arrange a San Francisco program for a delegation of Vietnamese educators, IIE/West Coast worked with IIE/New York, the U.S. Indochina Reconciliation Project, The Asia Foundation, California State University/Sacramento, Stanford University and the University of California/Berkeley. "Managing Our Environment" was the theme of the West Coast USIA seminar for 150 Fulbright grantees; issues explored ranged from waste management to energy alternatives to population control. IIE/West Coast awarded scholarships for study in the Asia/Pacific region to 111 undergraduates at IIE Educational Associate institutions.

IIE/LATIN AMERICA

In Mexico, in the words of IIE/Latin America director Alan Adelman, "Interest in U.S. higher education has exploded." Visits to the USIA-supported IIE advising center in Mexico City

IIE/EAST CENTRAL EUROPE

Developing regional advising services in cooperation with USIA and collecting and disseminating information on higher education reform were priorities for IIE's Budapest-based IIE/East Central Europe (ECE). Director Mary Kirk, as the Regional Educational Advising consultant to USIA, assisted the further development of over 40 advising centers throughout the region and organized a Regional Educational Advisers Workshop in Bucharest, Romania, in April. The Eisenhower Exchange Fellowships brought several U.S. midcareer professionals to Hungary, including Benjamin Riensche, an Iowa farmer with expertise in financial planning. His free consultation services were in great demand not only by farmers but also by planners and entrepreneurs. Kirk was also appointed director of IIE's new Moscow office.

IIE/RUSSIA AND EURASIA

IIE opened its office in Moscow in 1994 in response to the unprecedented challenges presented by the breakup of the former Soviet Union. IIE/Moscow provides in-country support for IIE-administered programs ranging from restructuring energy policy to developing an independent legal system to providing technical assistance to arts managers. For USAID's Energy Training Development Program, IIE/Moscow provides technical assistance in designing and delivering energy and environment training to key professional managers and policy makers. For the American Bar Association's Central and Eastern European Legal Initiative (CEELI), another USAID-funded activity, IIE provides management support for specialized legal training for lawyers and judges.

soared to record numbers. Staff members gave presentations at universities throughout Mexico, and opened four new test centers in Mexico to meet increased demand for the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL). For Mexican students graduating from U.S. campuses, IIE published *Returning to Mexico*, a guide to home-country job opportunities. This year's 49 recipients of the Ford-MacArthur Fellowships in the Social Sciences were noteworthy; over half were women and over half were from Central America. As USIA's Regional Educational Advising Consultant, IIE staff assisted educational advisers throughout Central America and Mexico to provide information on U.S. higher education.

IIE/SOUTHEAST ASIA

IIE/Southeast Asia's office moved to larger quarters in Bangkok in 1994, to accommodate both the USAID-sponsored training programs described on page 15 and expanded educational advising and testing services. IIE/Bangkok administers ETS standardized admissions tests in Thailand, including the TOEFL, the GRE, and the GMAT. The year saw a record 23% increase in TOEFL test-takers. Director Norman Goodman supervised the first official TOEFL administration in Vietnam. IIE/Bangkok's ninth annual U.S. University Fair in October attracted 71 participating universities, some 4,000 students and parents, and sponsorships from AT&T, Northwest Airlines, Coldwell Banker, Siam Commercial Bank, and Western Union Financial Services. As representatives for the East-West Center, IIE recruited Thai participants and publicized the program.

IIE/CHINA AND HONG KONG

IIE/China and Hong Kong, through its USAID-funded advisory services, keeps secondary school and university guidance counselors informed about U.S. higher education opportunities through newsletters in English and Chinese, outreach programs, and special seminars. The office began local registration services for the U.S. Secondary School Admissions Test (SSAT). In 1994, as USAID's Regional Educational Advising Consultant to China, staff visited Beijing and Guangzhou advising offices and sent material to offices throughout China. IIE/Hong Kong's annual U.S. University Fair, sponsored by AT&T, Western Union Financial Services, and Kaplan Educational Center, attracted a record 144 U.S. institutions and 4,300 students and parents. IIE/Hong Kong recruited candidates for the new Elisabeth Luce Moore Leadership Program for

Chinese Women. The office also produced the fifth edition of *Returning to Hong Kong*, listing employment opportunities for Hong Kong and Taiwanese graduates returning from the U.S., U.K., Canadian, and Australian academic institutions.

IIE PROJECT OFFICES/REPRESENTATIVES


These offices provide technical assistance, management-support, and training services for specific sponsored projects. IIE/Egypt provides training and support services for USAID's Egypt Energy Manpower Development Program. IIE/Philippines similarly serves USAID's Philippines BOT (Build-Operate-Transfer) project and the Philippines Rural Electrification Project. IIE/Ukraine provides training and support services for USAID's NIS Energy Development Training Program (EDTP). IIE staff in Chile, in cooperation with the Instituto Chileno Norteamericano de Cultura, is developing new scholarship, training, and educational advising programs in Chile and the other countries of the Southern Cone.

INDONESIA

IIE is represented in Indonesia by the International Education Foundation (IEF). Among 1994 activities: IEF conducted educational testing for ETS, screened candidates for the East-West Center; conducted the office's fifth U.S. University Fair, sponsored by AT&T and Bank Dwipa; and worked with the local American Chamber of Commerce on the third edition of *Returning to Indonesia*, a guide to employment opportunities for returning students from U.S. universities.

AIDAS BAREIKIS

Fulbrighter Aidas Bareikas, 27, contemplates his next move in creating his multimedia installation piece, Congestion, the Failure of Star Shooter, in his Hunter College studio. He chose to study in Hunter's Combined Media Program, with emphasis on painting, as a step toward re-forming a hypothesis that would represent the world conceptually "as a complicated medium of social and cultural phenomena, processes of nature, and political drama." Highly praised in the Lithuanian art world, he plans to teach at the Vilnius Art Academy when he returns.

ABOUT THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS...

THE FOLLOWING DESCRIBES THE WORK OF IIE IN EACH FUNCTIONAL AREA APPEARING IN THE AUDITED FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

PROGRAM SERVICES: SPONSORED PROGRAMS

INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE OF PERSONS

IIE brings foreign nationals to the United States for academic study and/or practical training and arranges for U.S. nationals to study, provide technical assistance, conduct research, teach, or serve as teaching assistants abroad. IIE also arranges training in third countries and gives courses and seminars in participants' home countries.

For foreign students and professionals, IIE services include technical assistance to sponsors in assessing training needs, identifying or developing appropriate training programs, selecting participants, and arranging for their admission to training programs. Training sources include academic degree programs, specialized short courses, internships, study tours, and professional affiliations. IIE disburses sponsor funds; acts as participants' visa sponsor; monitors their progress; provides English-language training when necessary; arranges professional and social enrichment activities; and maintains liaison with the training providers.

For U.S. students, IIE administers international study and professional-development programs for a variety of public and private sponsors, including USIA, USAID, the U.S. Department of State, foreign governments, nongovernmental organizations, and educational and cultural institutions. IIE conducts the nationwide competition for the USIA Fulbright grants for graduate study, conducts auditions for grants in the performing arts, and administers grants to students going to countries without Fulbright Commissions.

SCIENTIFIC COOPERATION ACTIVITIES

IIE provides international purchasing services to a number of international agricultural and other research institutes as well as to developing-country universities and nongovernmental organizations.

SHORT-TERM INTERNATIONAL VISITORS

IIE arranges U.S. visits for foreign leaders and specialists, singly and in groups. Most are sponsored by the U.S. Information Agency Office of International Visitors.

Each visit focuses on a specific theme, such as environmental protection, U.S. higher education, or the U.S. legal system. IIE arranges meetings with U.S. leaders and professionals, visits to cultural institutions, and home hospitality to provide a broad view of American life.

ASSISTANCE TO COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

IIE offices in Hong Kong, Bangkok, Budapest, and Mexico City administer and/or provide support services for the administration of tests of English-language competence and standardized U.S. university admissions tests. The Educational Testing Service (ETS) is the sponsor.

INSTITUTE EDUCATIONAL AND ARTS SERVICES

PUBLICATIONS, CENSUS, COUNSELING, LIBRARY, AND REFERENCE SERVICES

IIE conducts research and publishes findings relevant to all aspects of international education. IIE's annual census of foreign nationals studying in the United States is the basis of an annual publication, *Open Doors*. IIE researches and publishes comprehensive directories of study-abroad programs and provides information and advice on international study in its New York, regional, and overseas offices. IIE also maintains a specialized international education library in New York.

OVERSEAS AND REGIONAL OFFICE ACTIVITIES

IIE offices in Bangkok, Budapest, Hong Kong, and Mexico City provide information and educational services to students, universities, the business community, and government officials in the regions they serve, in addition to supporting IIE projects in their regions. IIE/Hong Kong-China, IIE/Mexico, and IIE/Bangkok maintain information centers on U.S. higher education, advising thousands annually, and conduct outreach programs for schools in their regions.

U.S. regional offices in Chicago, Denver, Houston, and San Francisco develop and conduct locally supported exchanges and support national IIE projects, including supervising IIE-related students in their

regions, monitoring their progress, and arranging professional enrichment programs and home hospitality. They also stimulate international awareness through discussion groups, seminars, and school outreach programs. IIE offices in Denver and Houston serve as centers for programming USIA international visitors.

ARTS SERVICES, STUDENT ACTIVITIES, CONFERENCES, AND PROJECTS

This category includes administrative costs of IIE's Arts International program as well as administrative costs of conferences and seminars on key international-education issues. IIE maintains an emergency loan fund for foreign students.

SUPPORTING SERVICES

MANAGEMENT AND GENERAL

This function includes expenses of running IIE as a whole, from human-resources management to equipment maintenance. A major 1994 investment was in technology and staff training to extend and upgrade IIE's worldwide electronic communications capabilities.

FUNDRAISING

This function is devoted to raising unrestricted funds to support IIE educational services to the public and to provide start-up funding for IIE-initiated programs to meet emerging needs. Funds come from individuals, corporations, and foundations as well as from fundraising benefits in New York, Chicago, Denver, Houston, and San Francisco honoring corporate and civic leaders.

PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT

This function includes developing special IIE initiatives and finding support for them, as well as coordinating development of IIE proposals to obtain grants and contracts from governments, foundations, corporations, academic institutions, nongovernmental organizations, and individuals to implement specific projects. Those IIE implemented in 1994 are described and/or listed in this report.
