


1997: THE YEAR AT A GLANCE

This year the Institute of International Education assisted nearly 18,000 women and men, 3,900 from the United States and 14,000 from abroad, representing 160 countries. This number of participants is a marked increase over last year and reflects several major new programs for which IIE assumed responsibility in 1997. Through an affiliation with the Council for International Exchange of Scholars, IIE now oversees the Fulbright Scholar Program (see page 12). IIE also undertook a number of new training projects around the world under two large new U.S. government initiatives: Development Training 2 and Global Training for Development (see page 22).

IIE programs serve an extremely varied group. They are students, teachers, faculty, artists and performers, scientists, technicians, civic and government leaders, and other professionals in every field. The diversity of IIE's programs reflects the diversity of these participants' academic and professional goals. In addition to traditional educational and cultural exchange, IIE administers long- and short-term training, specialized technical assistance,



IIE's program participants comprise several large groups: graduate and undergraduate students, college and university faculty, technical trainees, teachers, and other professionals.



STAFF

The Institute of International Education has 19 offices on four continents, employing 400 people: 144 at its New York headquarters; 148 in Washington, DC; and 29 at offices in Chicago, Denver, Houston, and San Francisco. Overseas, 79 IIE staff work in Egypt, Hong Kong, Hungary, India, Mexico, Namibia, the Philippines, Russia, South Africa, Thailand, the Ukraine, and Vietnam. The International Education Foundation (IEF) is IIE's cooperating institution in Indonesia.



VOLUNTEERS

Nearly 6,000 volunteers give their time and skills to IIE. They serve on IIE's national Board of Trustees, Regional Advisory Boards, program advisory boards, and selection committees. They also host foreign students and international visitors, serve as professional liaisons to the community, work on a variety of fundraising and other special events, and provide invaluable services in IIE offices worldwide.

workshops, specially-designed study tours, seminars, and conferences. This year the Institute administered close to 250 programs for more than 200 public and private sector sponsors.

As a global presence with 19 offices in 14 countries, IIE is ideally positioned to quickly and effectively meet the educational and training needs of many constituencies worldwide. This year this capability was strengthened by the opening of two new offices, in India and South Africa. Also, countless people rely on IIE for up-to-date information on all aspects of international education. The Institute's website has become a popular and important resource, offering information on a wealth of educational exchange opportunities, statistics on foreign students in the United States, and electronic access to selected IIE publications. IIE also maintains strong ties with academic institutions all over the world through its Educational and International Associates programs, a group of 600 accredited U.S. colleges and universities and 75 foreign academic institutions and U.S. nongovernmental organizations.

FUNDING

Programs are funded by U.S. and foreign government agencies, foundations, corporations, international organizations, international development agencies and banks, universities, nongovernmental organizations, endowments, and individual donors. Educational and arts services are supported by grants from the United States Information Agency (USIA); grants and contributions from corporations, foundations, and individuals; IIE Educational Associate and IIE International Associate membership fees; fundraising events; registration fees for U.S. university fairs overseas; and revenue from publications.



FINANCES

During fiscal 1997 (October 1, 1996 - September 30, 1997), IIE incurred total expenses of \$102,794,333.

Direct expenses for sponsored programs were \$95,025,526, which includes \$244,644 for volunteer services/in-kind contributions.

Total costs for IIE's information, research, counseling, conference, and arts services were \$2,785,511. Institute management and general, fundraising, and program development expenses were \$4,983,296, or 4.8% of total expenditures.

Fulbright Scholar Program

In January, 1997, IIE, which has managed the Fulbright Student Program since its creation, assumed responsibility for the Fulbright Scholar Program through an administrative affiliation with the Council for International Exchange of Scholars (CIES). In its fifty-year history of administering the Fulbright Scholar Program, CIES has facilitated exchanges for thousands of U.S. and foreign faculty and professionals. This new IIE/CIES relationship will benefit the Fulbright Program in several ways: bringing increased quality and cost-savings to its administration; strengthening public understanding and support; and enhancing both organizations' domestic and overseas capabilities. The arrangement will contribute to ongoing cooperation and shared goals for international academic exchange within the higher education community. Through this affiliation, the President of IIE serves on the CIES Advisory Board, and the CIES Board Chair serves on IIE's Board of Trustees.
