









OPEN DOORS FACT SHEET: BRAZIL

INSTITUTE OF INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION Educational Exchange Data from *Open Doors 2011*

In the 2010/11 academic year, **8,777** students from Brazil were studying in the United States. Brazil is the fourteenth leading place of origin for students coming to the United States.

Academic Level: The majority of Brazilian students study at the undergraduate level. In 2010/11, their breakdown was as follows:

46.3% undergraduate 34.8% graduate students

9.9% other

9.0% OPT (Optional Practical Training)

Historical trends: The number of Brazilian students in the U.S. increased steadily in the 1990s, peaking at 8,972 students in 2001/02. After many years of decline, the number of Brazilian students began to rebound in 2006/07, and then increased by 16% in 2008/09. In 2010/11, the number of Brazilian students in the U.S. remained relatively flat, and made up 1% of the total international student population in the United States.
