











OPEN DOORS FACT SHEET: INDONESIA

INSTITUTE OF INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION Educational Exchange Data from *Open Doors 2011*

In the 20010/11 academic year, **6,942** students from Indonesia were studying in the United States. Indonesia is the nineteenth leading place of origin for students coming to the United States.

Academic Level: The majority of Indonesian students study at the undergraduate level. In 2010/11, their breakdown was as follows:

64.5% undergraduate 22.2% graduate students

2.9% other

10.4% OPT (Optional Practical Training)

Historical trends: The number of Indonesian students studying in the U.S. grew steadily in the 1980s and 1990s, peaking at 13,282 students in 1997/98. It then declined through 2006/07, rebounded slightly in 2007/08, and again fell by 2% in 2008/09 and 8% in 2009/10. In 2010/11, the number of Indonesian students remained relatively flat. Indonesia remains a top 20 places of origin for international students in the United States.
