











OPEN DOORS FACT SHEET: MEXICO

INSTITUTE OF INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION Educational Exchange Data from *Open Doors 2011*

In the 2010/11 academic year, **13,713** students from Mexico were studying in the United States (up 3% from the previous year). Mexico is the ninth leading place of origin for students coming to the United States.

Academic Level: The majority of Mexican students study at the undergraduate level. In 2010/11, their breakdown was as follows:

59.5% undergraduate 28.5% graduate students

6.6% other

5.4% OPT (Optional Practical Training)

Historical trends: Mexico's geographic location, with a large and growing population along the border, allows for its students to study at border U.S. institutions. In some instances, students from Mexico are charged in-state tuition and able to cross the border every day, saving room and board. NAFTA has had a major impact on Mexico-U.S. exchanges, driving student numbers up. The number of students from Mexico steadily increased from the mid-1990s through 2008/09, with a small dips in 2004/05 and 2006/07, and a larger decrease in 2009/10.
