



# Workforce Development at IIE

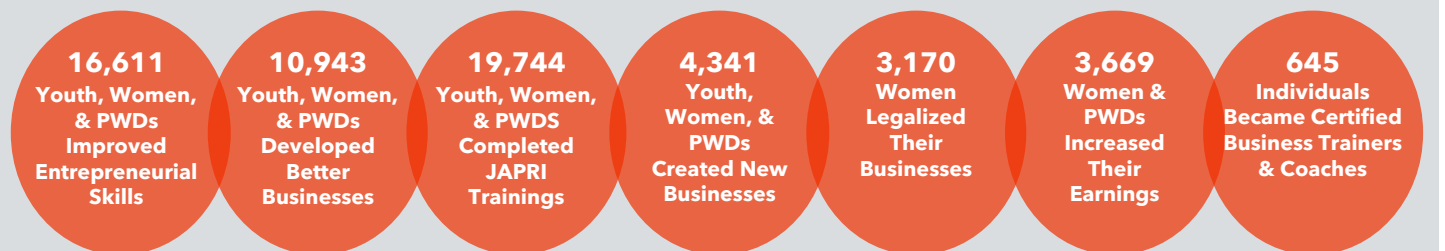

## IIE’s Approach to Workforce Development

- **Aligns Labor & Market Needs** – Workforce development programs must address both supply-side and demand-side needs. Through IIE’s entrepreneurship training modules and wraparound support services, individuals are able to create opportunities for themselves and others in their communities, while IIE’s collaboration with community stakeholders simultaneously encourages formal job creation.
- **Moves Beyond Training** – Impactful workforce development requires more than just providing trainings. IIE employs holistic programming that addresses the foundational skills and community support networks needed for success. IIE provides continuous coaching and mentoring to all participants and actively engages community members, such as families, local governments, and disabled persons organizations, to create an enabling environment for the individuals it serves.
- **Builds Local Partnerships** – IIE prioritizes working with local partners to develop and deliver unique workforce development programs tailored to meet the needs of local markets and communities. By working closely with community organizations, local governments, and higher education institutions, IIE’s multi-layered and scalable models are adapted and sustained by its partners.
- **Serves Marginalized Communities** – IIE centers its workforce development programs around serving individuals across a variety of ethnic, cultural, religious, racial, and educational backgrounds, particularly seeking to support poor and vulnerable youth, women, and persons with disabilities.

## Program Highlight: USAID JAdi Pengusaha Mandiri

In partnership with USAID, JAdi Pengusaha Mandiri (Become an Independent Entrepreneur, or JAPRI) equipped poor and vulnerable individuals in Indonesia with basic entrepreneurship skills and access to business coaching and mentoring to improve work opportunities through self-employment. During its proof of concept and full implementation phases (2017-2021), JAPRI provided youth ages 18-30 with entrepreneurship knowledge, basic business skills, and holistic support. Due to the success of the model, USAID later expanded JAPRI to support women (2019-2022) as well as persons with disabilities (2020-2022).
